What have you been doing since you left Gordon-Conwell and where are you serving now?

After studies at Gordon-Conwell, I completed a PhD in New Testament at the University of Cambridge, then taught New Testament at Cambridge and Gordon-Conwell before entering the pastorate. I've been the Lead Pastor of Pepperell Christian Fellowship, in Pepperell, MA (about an hour from Gordon-Conwell) for almost 14 years and have continued to teach New Testament at Gordon-Conwell during those years.

What do you love about your work? What are the particular joys and challenges of serving a rural church?

I love having the opportunity to preach God's Word and shepherd God's people. Pastoral work in a small-town church often entails a wide variety of responsibilities

because often the church isn't large enough to support a large, specialized staff. I actually appreciate this diversity of experiences. One morning I may be working in the Greek of a biblical passage or writing an article, and that afternoon I'll be visiting someone in the hospital, planning a capital campaign, praying for the congregation, or helping a married couple who are struggling.

How has God woven together your Gordon-Conwell education with other life events to bring you to where you are now?

My time at Gordon-Conwell contributed significantly to my sense of calling to pastoral ministry in New England. I love this region and am overjoyed to see God at work here. Teaching at Gordon-Conwell and





mentoring students there in the years since my graduation has only added to my appreciation of the importance of the seminary.

What has been Gordon-Conwell's biggest impact/influence on your ministry?

Gordon-Conwell's high view of the authority of Scripture and its strong and enduring commitment to faithful study and communication of the Bible has had a major impact on me.

What piece of advice would you give to young alumni who are just entering pastoral ministry?

Be much among the people in your congregation, and be deep in your relationship with God. Don't get swept along, or swept away, by passing fads. Sink deep roots in the Scriptures and love your people well.
