Huge population movements and religious surges take place year by year on the surface of our globe. Causes are: births, deaths, conversions, defections, and evangelization under its 600 dimensions and varieties. The dynamics of these changes are portrayed below. The globe is analyzed from its top to its bottom into the 3 horizontal Worlds A, B, and C. Its populations are then shown moving through life from left to right. They are analyzed into 3 vertical segments of human life—births, change (from childhood to adult life to old age, with persons becoming evangelized or converts or defectors), and deaths.

Table A below gives the detailed statistics of these changes. It is arranged as 5 minitables and 27 lines or rows of figures. Each minitable (A,B,C,D,E) views the global scene

from the standpoint of a different grouping and shows its demographic deployment in Worlds A, B, and C. The lines az' enumerate 27 categories of globe-wide change—gains, losses, increases, decreases. Lines are progressively derived or computed from earlier lines; column 3 shows how or whence. ('UN' refers to *World population prospects 1998*. Tables 1 refers to *WCE* Part 4 "Countries".)


